From the Pastor ...

I had so much fun driving the Advent bags around today, all. It was such a joy to be in the presence – the actual, physical presence – of so many of you today. I know I've said it before, but I miss seeing y'all every Sunday, and I know you miss seeing one another as well.

Not surprisingly, there was one theme that came up in many conversations: it's time for 2020 to GO AWAY!! Bye bye, 2020. Time to move along!

And, friends, I couldn't agree more.

There are things we've endured. There are things we've postponed. There are things we've missed.

There are fears we've harbored. There are stresses we've endured. There are turbulent waters we've navigated ... barely.

It's. Been. Rough.

However, as we look back, we'll hopefully recognize some blessings among the remains – some joys, some celebration moments, some smiles, some encouragement, some hope. There have been new births and more birthdays. There have new engagements and more anniversaries. There have been moments of laughter. There have been moments of beauty. There have been God-moments – undeniable, inescapable God-moments.

For the past 8 yrs., on the Sunday after Christmas – always the last Sunday of the year – we've celebrated a worship service in which we look both back at the year that's been and ahead at the year to come. And as part of that service, I've asked you to share your responses to two questions:

Where have you seen God in the past year? Where do you hope to find God in the year ahead?

Because of the limitations of the way we're worshiping right now, this type of service is going to be too difficult to coordinate. But as we look at turning the page on 2020 and getting a fresh start in 2021, I

commend these questions to you for reflection, for journaling (if you're a journaling person), for prayer, and for your time with God. Even in all the distresses and distractions of 2020, where have you seen God? Even in all the uncertainty and upendedness that we've currently living in, where do you hope to see God in 2021?

The peace of Christ must control your hearts—a peace into which you were called in one body. And be thankful people. The word of Christ must live in you richly. Teach and warn each other with all wisdom by singing psalms, hymns, and spiritual songs. Sing to God with gratitude in your hearts. Whatever you do, whether in speech or action, do it all in the name of the Lord Jesus and give thanks to God the Father through him.



New Treasurer



About Per Capita

As 2020 comes to a close, I wanted to give you a reminder about per capita payments. Here's a brief rundown of what per capita is and how it works.

"One of the great strengths of our denomination is its connectionism. Presbyterians in Minnesota and Wisconsin are tied to the larger church in ministry. One concrete form of that connection is through our per-capita. Every Presbyterian church in the country is required to pay a certain amount for each active member on its rolls. This money goes to support the work and ministry of our church throughout the country." – from the website of the Presbytery of the Twin Cities Area



It is and has been the policy of the Presbyterian Church of Oronoco to pay our per capita by the end of every year, whether individual members have contributed their apportionment or not. If you haven't paid your per capita for this year, please consider doing so. You can make a check out to the O church and simply write "per capita" in the memo. If you're not sure whether you've paid your per capita this year, please contact Kim Stanton or Hadley Thompson.

The per capita for 2021 is the same as last year: \$36.50.




Advent Sermon Series

This year, Advent is going to look entirely different. It's going to look like no Advent we've ever been through before, and not in a way that we're probably excited about.

But despite all the challenges and missing pieces that this holiday season will bring, Jesus is indeed coming. The Star of Bethlehem will shine. The angels will sing. And the Christ-child will be born. It will happen anyway, even in the face of all the trials and tribulations we've all been dealing with since March 2020.

And that's the focus of this year's Advent sermon series: "It Happened Anyway." Following along with the Narrative Lectionary readings, we're going to dive into ways that God has shown up in the past despite all the crud and crisis happening in the lives of God's people. Here's the breakdown:

- 1st Sunday Daniel 6:6-27 → It Happened Anyway... in the Face of Danger and Fear
- 2nd Sunday– Joel 2:12-13, 28-29 → It Happened Anyway... in the Face of Our Own Failings
- 3rd Sunday Isaiah 61:1-11 → It Happened Anyway... in the Face of Things That Hold Us Back
- 4th Sunday Luke 1:26-45 → It Happened Anyway... in the Face of Closed Doors and "No Room"

Pastor Lisa and the Session continue to have conversations about this and look into the latest recommendations and resources that are available – CDC, Minnesota Department of Health, Olmsted and Goodhue County resources, . Of course, we want to be back together again because we know we all miss one another, but we also want to make sure we're doing what's best and safest for one another's health.



The most recent decision was that we would remain online-only through **January 2021**. I know that this is difficult, especially as it means we will not be able to worship in-person together on Christmas Eve. But helping one another stay safe and healthy is our number one priority.

Keeping Up with the Smith-Mathers



We've been helping to support Shelvis and Nancy and their family for a few years now. We've been collecting our 2nd Sunday Spare Change offering and lifting them up in prayer. We need to lift them up even more in prayer right now, friends. The COVID-19 pandemic has rocked their world as well. In their most recent update letter, they shared that Nancy is pregnant again but there may be some problems with the baby's heart. In addition to this concern, ahead of the U.S. borders closing this past March, they decided to leave Great Britain and come home to be with family in the U.S. As they have attempted to find some semblance of being settled, they have moved their entire family a number of times this year already: 4 different homes in the last 6 months, according to their letter. Like many overseas missions organizations, the PC(USA) has extended their travel ban for mission personnel to June 30, 2021, so they know they aren't headed back to Africa anytime soon. And because of choices and restrictions put in place by Oxford University, Shelvis is unable to continue his doctoral program at this time and has had to take a temporary leave of absence.

It is a lot, friends. In this time of uncertainty and upheaval, Shelvis and Nancy and their family clearly still need our prayers, and they still need our support. I know that we're not gathering our spare change offering as we continue to meet virtually, but you can still help support Shelvis and Nancy. Visit their Presbyterian Mission Agency page:
